






Stigma (Stig-ma) *noun:* A mark of disgrace associated with a particular circumstance quality or person

- Examine the quality assurance and community engagement with maintaing a recovery oriented community




Adverse healthcare experiences affect recovery access


Why is QA important in stigma reduction?
